

### When is the best time to plant, you ask?

In Victoria we are fortunate to have weatherthat allows us to plant nearly year-round but if you're looking for the best time to plant **-fall is perfect**.

Cooler weather, soil which is still warm and natural rainfall provide the ideal conditions for successful planting. Trees, shrubs and perennials that go in the ground in fall have a chance to start establishing their root system before winter weather sets in which gives them a jump start for next spring.

The tree program at Russell Nursery is geared towards fall planting. We grow most of the trees we sell (including Japanese maples) from either bare-root stock or liners. Our **greatest selection of trees** is ready now for fall planting.

Spring and summer flowering bulbs should be planted out between September and December. Our **bulbs have arrived** just in time! ## Trees need our help

**Newly planted trees require extra TLC** to ensure they get off to a good start. If you are the proud parent of a new tree, you might enjoy reading <a href="How to care">How to care</a> for a young tree. This article provides information and tips on how trees grow, their watering needs and how to avoid wildlife damage.

Damage from deer can be devastating for young trees (or any tree with a smaller diameter). Starting in early fall, bucks use trees as scratching posts to remove the velvet from their antlers. They also rub trees to mark their territory and attract females. Protecting tree trunks with a barrier like the tree trunk guard pictured is highly recommended!



Locally made tree guards are available for sale at the nursery.

### **Plants We Love**

Working at the nursery, we get to know lots of plants. Some stand out for us because of their unique beauty and/or how well they perform in the garden. Here are some we think you should know about...

### Styrax 'Evening Light'

Why we love it: Styrax 'Evening Light' is a relatively small tree (10-15' high x 10-15' wide in ten years) that has an upright habit, deep purple leaves and pendulous white bell-shaped flowers. Flowers give way to olive-shaped drupes that persist until late fall.

Where to use it: Use this tree as a single dramatic specimen in a small space or consider a grouping to create impact in a larger garden. Best colour in full sun.



**How to take care of it:** Ensure this tree has adequate moisture and good drainage. Stake when first planted but then very little maintenance required to keep this tree looking good.

Geranium 'Rozanne' Why We Love It: Geranium 'Rozanne' provides longlasting colour in the garden. Its violet-blue flowers play

well with many other plants and can last for months (from early summer through to fall). Winner of both the RHS Award of Garden Merit as well as Perennial Plant of the Year in 2008. Grows to 18" high x 24" wide. Where to Use It: This is a great front-of-the-border edging plant and is also very useful and showy as a



mass underplanting for trees. Will do well in full sun and partial sun locations. **How to take Care of It:** Provide moist, well drained soil. Flowering slows down midseason, can prune back to half to encourage more blooms.

#### **Berberis 'Concorde'**



Why We Love It: Berberis 'Concorde' is a wonderful small shrub that will add colour to any garden. It is one of the darkest barberries with a deep red-burgundy leaf colour that turns crimson in fall. Although it loses its leaves in winter, it starts leafing out very early in spring. Grows to 18" high x 18" wide. Where to Use It: Best colour in full sun. This berberis looks fantastic planted in drifts near the front of a border, along with ornamental grasses and dwarf pines.

**How to take Care of It:** Provide moist, well drained soil. No pruning necessary.


## **Blast from the Past**

**Ten Tips for Successful Planting** 

The principle of '**Do it once, do it right'** definitely applies to planting. Get new plants off to a good start by paying attention to the basics. You will be glad you did.

- **1. Plants Grow!** The most common planting mistake is not allowing enough space between plants. Read plant tags carefully to determine appropriate site and spacing.
- **2. Soak plants well while still in their nursery pots.** Soak in a bucket or dribble with the hose.
- **3. Dig the planting hole** the same depth as, and 2 to 3 times wider than the root ball. Fill with water and let it drain away more than once if it's dry.



#### 4. Tease and spread roots gently outward.

Entwined roots need loosening - slice vertically and splay. If the roots are a solid mass, slice an inch or so right off the bottom. **Don't skip this step!** 

- 5. Find the root flare and place plants in the hole, make sure that the root flare is at grade. Do not plant too deeply the root flare should be at the soil surface.
- **6.** Half fill the hole around the plant with native soil. Add a handful of bone meal and no more than 25% of amendments like compost. Exception is heavy clay mix in one third gritty compost and/or bark mulch. Water the partly filled hole to settle the soil, then top up with the rest of the soil.
- **7. Tamp down soil** around plant, gently but firmly.
- **8. Mulch** around plant with compost or bark mulch. Avoid getting mulch close to woody stems or crown of plant.
- **9. Stake trees** with a sturdy stake on either side of the root ball.
- **10. Water** slowly and deeply. Always water at planting time, even if the soil is wet and it's raining. Watering settles the soil around the roots and eliminates air pockets.

#### Summer is the time to check your irrigation

It's easier to see problems in the summer and fall, when shrubs are in leaf and perennials are full grown, than in spring when branches are bare and plants are dormant. Look for sprinklers that are blocked or areas that are being missed and either repair or make a list for spring.

#### Winter is the time to check your drainage

It's hard to relate to poor drainage at this time of year, so make a point of touring the garden when it's really wet, and looking for squishy spots. Make note of areas that need to be remediated or replanted with water tolerant plants.
